I have no objection, per se, to the transfer of the Lambert's Cove Inn's liquor license to Jon and Stephanie Saunders. But, as you are very much aware, I am likely unalterably opposed to any expansion of the Inn, either physically or through additional venue activities.

The Saunders have stated that they want to be sensitive to the surrounding residential neighborhood and plan to engage much more with the community than John and Keya Cain have. But the Cains said exactly the same thing, and what that engagement yielded was, sadly, multiple battles with the neighborhood. The result of all this, and one hopes the Saunders are aware of it, is that the Cains are selling a non-conforming property that is now substantially more regulated by the Town than it was when they bought it. So much for productive community engagement.

There is no denying that the Inn has become an increasingly incompatible use with our neighborhood. This is not the time for more discussion of the many adverse impacts caused by the Inn. My sole purpose in writing to you now is the hope that you will emphasize to the Saunders that the Inn weighs heavily on the neighborhood, and that while the neighbors wish them success, they must recognize that that success cannot be translated into further burdens borne by the neighbors.

Re: "the application of LCI Hospitality LLC (Lambert's Cove Inn) 90 Manaquayak Road, West Tisbury, for an alcoholic beverage license for retail sale of wine and malt beverages only to patrons in the 70 seat sit down restaurant featuring breakfast, lunch and dinner."

We have been neighbors and abutters to the Lambert's Cove Inn property since its beginning in 1969. In the more than sixty years since then, the Inn has by and large been a good neighbor. However, as part of its expansion since it was classified as a nonconforming use, and in particular associated with the Inn hosting private events such as weddings, the Inn's patrons have created disturbances especially noise, that has been correlated with the availability of alcoholic drinks.

That the Inn has a restaurant open to the public, that the restaurant has a 70 seat capacity, and that in recent years the Inn has had a license from the town to serve beer and wine, are all expansions of the nonconforming use.

While we are hopeful that the prospective new owners, LCI Hospitality LLC, will be good neighbors, due to our experience in the last few years, we are contacting the board with two concerns and requests related to the application. These are:

- 1. Despite its prohibition, hard liquor was served at the LCI on multiple occasions since the beer and wine license was issued.
- ** We would like the Board of Selectmen to make explicit that hard liquor is never allowed to be served at the LCI.

There might appear to be two exceptions to that rule, but in fact, none of them apply in this case:

- A one-day special license can be issued by the Town, but not to "any premises that has an alcoholic beverages license." (Source: AABC)
- The caterer's §12C license is not valid "at a location already licensed to serve alcohol." (Source: AABC)
- **BYOB:** Mass. ABCC's Chief Investigator has confirmed that a wedding party (say) cannot bring their own alcohol to a private function. It's not allowed. "That's definite. No doubts."
- 2. Hours: When LCI has served alcohol at private functions, to 11 pm, causing disturbance to us.
- ** We ask that the town set 10pm, rather than 11pm, as the limit to the hours when alcohol may be served,
